Village Meeting Supplement

The Annual Parish Meeting took place on 13th March in the Church Room. This supplement includes a summary of the main points raised by most of the organisations represented.

CLAYDON WITH CLATTERCOTE PARISH COUNCIL

Parish Councillors

David Hill, Chairman of the Parish Council reported that at the time of the election only 5 candidates stood so they were duly appointed without a vote being necessary. He thanked Robert Adams who did not seek re-election for all his help and efforts since becoming a councillor in 2002.

Parish Clerk

Louise Ashton who works full time for South Northants and Cherwell District Councils took on the part-time role from 1st September. Sue Morgan, the previous clerk, who resigned in May last year for personal reasons, was thanked for her efforts and wished well for the future.

Finance 2011/12

David Hill reported that a budget of £4422 was set in January 2011, with a predicted income of £3962. Although there was a £460 shortfall between income and expenditure the village precept was reduced by £200 to £3800. To date actual income is £4619 while actual expenditure to date has been £3259 plus a further £1674 committed, leaving a shortfall of £314 thus reducing the projected balance for the Council at year end to £1190 plus £456 in the reserve account.

Finance 2012/13

In January this year the Parish Council set the expenditure budget at £6559 excluding VAT with the income predicted at £4384. There is a shortfall of £2175 between income and expenditure, but the Council has taken a pragmatic view that it will probably not spend over £1000 of the budget due to statutory obligations such as £959 for the election of a new councillor. The budget includes a grant of £500 towards the Church Room Project and £250 for any co-ordinated village Diamond Jubilee celebrations. The precept which forms part of your Council Tax was increased by £200 to £4000. This means an extra 1p per week from most village households.

Allotments

All of the 17 allotment plots continue to be let. Rents for 2012/2013 are due in April and the rent continues to be £5.00 per plot.

CLAYDON PAROCHIAL CHURCH COUNCIL

Keith Hamilton reported that in addition to funding their normal running expenses and the £7000 quota set by the Diocese, the PCC has agreed a donation of £400 towards the Church Room Project. A new contractor has also been employed to cut the churchyard.

CLAYDON PLAYING FIELD MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE (PFMC)

Mike Smith, the Treasurer reported the resignation of Paul Jones. Paul Gallagher has now been appointed Chairman, with the other members being Emma Gallagher as Secretary and Garry Putt.

Fundraising has been very successful during the year with a net total of £932 raised from the summer dog show and the bonfire.

The field has been in a much better condition over the past 12 months with the grass being cut regularly. Costs for each cut have increased in 2012 to £75. With 16 cuts needed the cost for the year will be £1200 of which £1000 will be covered by the grant from the Parish Council. The remainder will be met by fund raising and reserves.

A one-off cost of £580 was incurred for hedge cutting, ditch clearing and hole filling in the Children's Play Area. Further expenditure will be incurred by erecting a fence along the open side of the Play Area.

The PFMC are currently organising a weekend where volunteers from the village get together to do some general maintenance work like painting the swings and treating the fences. The Committee are also actively pursuing opportunities for further development and enhancement of the field that will benefit the village.

CLUSTER CARE GROUP

Veronica Purdey presented the Cluster Care Group report on behalf of Hazel Paxton, the Chairman. Cluster meets at 10.00 am on Tuesdays in the Pavilion in Cropredy for a good chat over tea or coffee and biscuits followed by entertainment such as a film, or a talk. There are also armchair exercises to help with movement and co-ordination and word games or a quiz to keep the brain as active as possible. A two course lunch is cooked by the Plough at Little Bourton. After lunch there may be card games,

bingo, or whist. Members are also taken out twice a year, once when the Pavilion is in use for Fairport weekend, and in December for a pre-Christmas lunch.

Although Oxfordshire County Council pays for the hire of the Pavilion, the paid staff and the insurance, all of the entertainment expenses have to be met by fundraising. The Parish Council was thanked for its donation of £50.

JUBILEE GROUP

Dorothy Beckett reported that the Jubilee Group continues to hold its coffee mornings as they have done for the last 10 years providing a great opportunity for a get together and a chat. Everyone is welcome

For the price of £1 there is coffee, a scone with cream and jam and a raffle ticket – outstanding value for money and one of the few things that have stayed the same price for such a long time. Scones (and mince pies at Christmas) are donated by Glenis Doran, raffle prizes are given by the group themselves. A small profit is saved for a donation to a charity of particular significance to the group. This year everyone has their minds on the Church Room Project, to which £200 has been donated.

VILLAGE WEBSITE

Paul Gallagher has taken over the website www.claydonvillage.co.uk. He is contacting all village groups and individuals who can supply information to make it truly representative of the whole village.

CLAYDON TRUST

David Hill reported that during the past 12 months the Trust had received a donation of £100 from the Jubilee Group, resulting in a balance of £1451.78 at year end. This year as in 2002 the Trust will provide a free Commemorative Mug for all children aged 11 and under. The Trust will also co-ordinate and finance a draw to be held on the Jubilee Weekend. A loan, if needed, of £200 is also available, to the Church Room Committee to be repaid within 12 months through its own fundraising.

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

Clive Mutch reported that Paul Gallagher has joined the team of co-ordinators. The current main concerns are metal theft and theft of number plates. Screws to prevent the latter can be bought from Halfords. Telephone scams are also on the increase and can be reported to the Fraud Hotline on **0300 123 2040**.

POOR'S LAND TRUST

Eric Bates reported a total income of £422.58 with £480 being paid out in benefits. The shortfall (£57.42) was taken from the contingency fund leaving reserves of £989.80. Payments are currently made to over 65s, widows and widowers. Some villagers have opted out, but 32 currently receive benefits.

CLAYDON CAR SERVICE

Thelma Tibbetts reported that use of the Car Service has increased during the past year with occasional trips for one person to the Luncheon Club in Cropredy and a weekly short journey within the village itself. Please ring Thelma Tibbetts on 690574 if you need to use the service to attend a medical appointment or for a prescription to be collected etc.

SENIOR CITIZENS' CHRISTMAS LUNCH

David Hill reported that 16 villagers attended a very enjoyable Christmas Lunch on 13th December at the Bell Inn, Great Bourton, at a special price of £12.95 per head. The lunch has been held in various venues since it was started in the 1980s by John Lloyd and Iris Allen. COURIER

Vicky Smith reported an active year supported by an array of sponsors.

CLAYDON ART GROUP

Pete Kearney thanked villagers for their support at the Art Festival which enables the group to survive and thrive. Another two members have joined but as with 90% of the Group they are from outside the village. The current teacher is a local professional artist who is helping members to significantly improve.

The exhibition this year will be on Sunday 26th and Monday 27th August.

CLAYDON HISTORY SOCIETY

David Hill reported a successful first exhibition on 25th July and thanked all villagers who contributed facts and photographs to help make the event such a success. £110 (50% of the profits) was donated to the Church Room Project. Clive Mutch is in the process of arranging the material to give a record of the village in the 20th Century linked to a timeline of key events elsewhere.

The Society is taking on two projects for the Diamond Jubilee – the first to produce a plan of Claydon in 1952 with appropriate photographs and the second to draw up a plan of the Churchyard showing the graves and the names of their occupants. The latter is an ongoing project and is unlikely to be completed by 5th June.
